Rabbinical Word

It is said of the founder of Hasidism, Rabbi Israel Baal Shem Tov, that whenever the Jewish community was threatened with calamity, he would go into a forest, to a certain spot, to meditate. There he lit a special fire and said a special prayer - and the disaster was averted. After his death, his disciple, the Maggid von Meseritsch, took over the leadership of the Hasidic movement. Even in his time there were enough reasons to worry about the people, and so he also tried to help. He went to the same spot in that forest and said to God, "Lord of the



universe, listen! I can't start the fire, but I know the place and I can say the prayer." It is said that this helped. Many years later, Rabbi Moscheh-Leib of Sassov tried to save the Jewish people from misfortune and went to this forest. He said, "I can't light the fire, nor do I know the prayer, but I know the place." Later, Rabbi Israel of Rushin became a major leader who had a special responsibility to protect the people. But he stayed in his house, holding his head in his hands, and said to God, "I can't light the fire anymore, I don't know the prayer and I can't even find the special place in the forest. All I can do is tell this story. And that has to be enough." And it was enough.

Passover is the feast of storytelling. Throughout the evening of the Seder we will tell the story of Israel in Egypt and the Exodus from bondage. And it says in the Haggadah: "Whoever speaks about it, shall be praised!" And it's not just about retelling the past — we're supposed to tell it as if we're just emerging from bondage ourselves. Symbols such as matzah, bitter herbs, salt water, "clay" (charoset) help us visualize, but it is equally important to tell our own stories of oppression and liberation. This is how Jewish life stories intertwine over the millennia. We do not know the specific place where the huts of the Israelites stood in Egypt, where exactly they crossed the Red Sea, but the thought of departure and liberation continues to burn within us. We can hold on to its truth even in times of bondage, war and suffering, because we know that "Pharaoh" will not have the last word. Our story is one of hope, and we continue to tell our children about it so that they too can proudly join the tradition of being part of Israel and keep the idea of freedom alive.

I wish us all a meaningful, kosher and happy Passover.


The delicious hamantaschen, baked by a group of members and led by Olga Gerr, were delicious and made our lavish celebration a joy for all.

"Blessed are You, Lord our God, King of the world, who lacks nothing in his world and created in it beautiful creatures and lovely trees for the children of adults to enjoy."

Seder night

In memory of Mrs. Polina Pelts

On Thursday, April 27th, we would like to remember the first and former Vice President and founding member of our congregation, Polina Pelts, of blessed memory. We owe her so much: Polina was the heart of the community and on this day, initiated by the community members, songs and stories will be performed in her honor.

Yom Hashoah

In 1951, on the 27th Nisan, the Israeli Knesset set Yom HaShoah, which is commemorated with a state ceremony in the Yad Vashem memorial in Jerusalem. At exactly 10:00 a.m., a shrill siren sounds throughout the land. Everything comes to a halt as people everywhere stand in silence and our murdered brothers and sisters are remembered. On Tuesday, April 18, we will also commemorate the countless victims of the Shoah and invite you to join us. We will recite prayers, texts and light six memorial candles.

Yom HaAzma'ut

The time from Yom HaShoah through the commemoration day Yom HaSikkaron to the Independence Day Yom HaAzma'ut are called the "Israeli High Holidays" because their events refer to central aspects of Jewish and Israeli identity today. The Shabbat during this time is called "Shabbat Tekumah," Shabbat of National Reestablishment. The Kabbalat Shabbat service on April 21 will focus on these themes.

After many years of dedicated work, we say goodbye to our caretaker Heinrich Moos, who will retire in April. There is probably no one who knows our community center as well as he does!
