Rabbinic word

It is now 77 years since the Allied forces defeated Nazi Germany and forced their surrender. We have remembered this momentous day in our congregation annually because the traces of the horrific Second World War remain omnipresent. During last year's program, many members shared memories and stories of relatives who lost their lives as soldiers or civilians, described the evacuation of theirs families, and recounted the difficult survival during and after this war. May 9th was a solemn date which commemorated the terrible sacrifices made then.



This year we will not have a "Victory Day celebration" as in past years. Our hearts are broken as we hear the daily news of Russia's war against Ukraine. The reports and the horrific images that reach us every day mingle with those we remember and leave us full of the speechless fear. We will have to find the form and language for future commemorations.

Our mourning for the soldiers who died in the fight against Nazi Germany and the civilian victims we express in this Yiskor prayer:

Yiskor for the brave men and women of the Allied Forces who lost their lives in World War II as they fought to defeat the evil of Nazi Germany.

Eternal One,

We thank you for the victory of the allied forces over the criminal powers of the Second World War.

We bring before you the memory of the men and women who fought for and gave their lives for victory over tyranny.

Grant them true rest under the wings of the Shechinah and bind their souls in the Covenant of Life. Millions of innocent civilians and soldiers were killed and murdered. Countless millions experienced terrible suffering.

We pray for all the souls of all who were killed, be they Jewish, Christian, Moslem or atheist, for recruits and volunteers, young and old, military personnel and partisans, underground heroes and resistance fighters against Nazism.

We commemorate the members of the Red Army, the soldiers of the U.S. Army, the British Armed Forces, La Résistance and all other armed forces that did their part in the resistance and defeat of the forces of evil.

We pray for all those, who, on land, in the air and at sea, in Europe, Asia and Africa and for those who fell in battle and for those who succumbed to their injuries and for those who did not experience Victory Day.

In blessed memory of all those who sacrificed so that we live today, we offer you this prayer.

Eternal, remembering the covenant and grace, accept our prayer for the fallen and murdered. Blessed are you, Eternal One, who answers prayers.

Lag BaOmer

On Thursday, May 19th at 5:00 p.m., we will celebrate Lag BaOmer once again in the garden of the Lutheran-Reformed Church, Hugenottenstraße 3. Lag BaOmer marks the 33rd day of the seven weeks from Passover to Shavuot, the Omer Period. Historically, in the days of the Jerusalem Temple, a thanksgiving offering was made from the first barley harvest on the first morning of the Passover. From that point on, the days were counted until the 50th day, which was Shavuot. A thanksgiving offering of the first fruits and wheat was made.

The Talmud speaks of Rabbi Akiva students' dying during the Omer period, this period is considered a period of mourning. But the 33rd day is observed as a joyful day, since then the dying stopped. We celebrate the end of this mourning period with a campfire and a picnic. As in previous years, we will offer a barbeque with kosher hotdogs and ask everyone to bring a parve salad to share. Heartfelt thanks to our neighbors for sharing their church yard. We hope many church members will join us!
