

Dear members of the community, friends and supporters,

L'Shanah Tovah to all of you! May you and your families enjoy good health, happiness, peace and well-being for the coming year 5779!

This summer we've enjoyed unusually hot, sunny weather. We look forward to getting back to a more regular schedule and the High Holy Days bring just that. Beautiful and meaningful services await us all plus interesting meetings, concerts, lectures and celebrations.

Despite the heat and summer break, there were a number of events in our synagogue in July and August that we would like to share with you.



Several of our youngsters attended the summer camp organized and led by the Youth department of the Union of Progressive Jews in Germany. Before the campers left, a special service was held wishing them well and acknowledging their hard work at school. This year's religious school class' achievements were celebrated on the last Shabbat in June. The synagogue was adorned with large Hebrew letter pennants, which the children had crafted themselves. All the letters of the Alef-Bet they had learned in the past year were colorfully painted and hung for all to see. In addition, the children had entered the different holidays during the past year and illustrated them with their own drawings, also hung in the synagogue. As a reward for their diligent work, the children received certificates, Alef-Bet stickers and sweets. It was a pleasure to see that the children have discovered how fun learning about Judaism can be. We hope that by the end of the new school year, the white letters will also be colored in. The reading and writing of the Alef-Bet and the knowledge of the Hebrew language are the key to familiarity with Judaism and a secure Jewish identity.

The congregation enjoyed Shabbat services during the summer months and in June, our Rabbi Ulrike was with us for three weekends. Her sermons gave us much to think about and sparked good conversations. In addition to visiting the sick, our Rabbi was busy teaching children and adults and the Giyur candidates. We are very lucky to have such a rabbi in our midst.

Rabbi Ulrike spent the month of July in Israel. There she attended a rabbinical seminar, studying at the renowned Shalom Hartman Institute on her "holidays." While she was in Israel, she also met with Rabbi Ya'ir Tobias. He is a rabbi of the Jordan Valley region in the north of the country. County Commissioner Mr. Tjark Bartels is leading a group of local politicians, business leaders and a representative from our congregation on a week-long trip to establish a city partnership. Representing our congregation is synagogue board member Olga Gerr. We thank Rabbi Offenberg for establishing contact with her colleague Rabbi Tobias and forging plans for our cooperation.

For those of you reading this newsletter and belonging to a synagogue with its own rabbi and regular services, it is hard to understand that this is a problem for us. With a Jewish immigrant population, we are financially taxed to make ends meet. Our members, on an average pay only the minimum annual dues of \$50.00. For American readers especially, this is hard to imagine. If you or your congregation could adopt us as a Mitzvah project or if a donation for the Rabbi's fund is feasible for you, know that you would be helping us immensely. In July, only one service was held, which was lay-led by Rachel and Rebekka. The turnout was amazing, certainly due to the desire of many members to see and hear Rebekka cantor again. Her beautifully clear mezzo-soprano voice carried many worshippers on a musical journey of spirituality. Especially adorable was Rebekka and Amitai's one-year-old baby Taavi, who was lulled to sleep in her arms and through his mother's song. As always everyone enjoyed the delicious Kiddush table set by Liubov.

A lecture in collaboration with the Society for Christian-Jewish Cooperation "Mod Helmy" was very well attended and resulted in an unknown and compelling story. Here is an excerpt from an article by Wolfhard F. Truchseß:

"It was not so much a reading as a narrative lecture, with the journalist Igal Avidan presenting the story of his research and thus also the story of the Egyptian doctor, Mod Helmy, in an exciting and entertaining way. A surgeon and physiotherapist came across the story of physician Mod Helmy when she opened her practice in 1991 in Berlin-Moabit, right under Helmy's former home. Israeli journalist Igal Avidan, who also lives in Berlin, discovered the story and dedicated time and research, resulting in his book, *Mod Helmy—How an Arab Doctor Rescued Jews in Berlin from the Gestapo.*"











At the invitation of the Society for Christian-Jewish Cooperation, Avidan read from his book and told the story of this courageous doctor in the sanctuary of the Reform Jewish Synagogue Hameln. It was a fascinating story, holding the audience glued to their seats.

Our monthly Senior's Breakfast, sponsored by Aktion Mensch, topic this year is healthy nutrition in ageing. The issue of salt in one's diet was of special interest. There was concentrated interest during the talk about the effect of salt on the body. Many questions followed and continued with the delicious breakfast prepared by Dora Bogachik and Anna Anikina. The buffet included a variety of dishes with vegetables, fish and sweet and savory pastries. Everyone enjoyed the lecture, the lovely table and meeting and communicating with each other.

Another breakfast with a healthy diet took place on 14th August. We talked about nutritional problems for people with Alzheimer's. Basically, it was about the question of which foods can prevent this serious illness. At the meeting, this met with great interest, so that the conversation was continued at the table, which in turn was perfectly prepared by Dora Bogachik and Anna Anikina.

The Sunday Café was also very well attended. The film about the history of Russian Jews aroused much interest. The lively discussion about the film continued with a meal.

Thanks to all who have prepared and participated in these events. We look forward to the next meetings.

During the summer break, our children's group met twice as well. Youth leader Olga Trieskunova reports:

"The thirteenth excursion took place on 10.08.2018. The children and their parents decided to visit the public library in Hamelin again. Everyone found something interesting for themselves in the library. In addition to exciting books, the children could also choose interesting CDs to listen to, played different board games together or just colored quietly. In between, they took breaks for snacks. At the second meeting, the children played together at a small playground and talked a lot to each other about the summer holidays and reminisced about summer camp."

Last but not least, Rachel Dohme represented our community, distributed information about our congregation and Reform Judaism and engaged in lively discussions at a World Religions Cultural Festival in the near-by city of Rinteln.



holiday of the Jewish year. The next morning our services continue and after Yiskor and Neila prayers, we will break the 25-hour fast together. Of course, children, the elderly or ill should not fast. For our school-age children, school-release forms are available in the office.

On Sunday, September 23, we celebrate Sukkot in the Sukkah in our synagogue courtyard. At 3:00 pm our children will decorate the sukkah and we hope some grown-ups will join in the fun. At 5:30 pm the Sukkot service begins for our Feast of Tabernacles.

On Sunday, the 30th of September at 17.30, we meet again in the synagogue and look forward to it. Do not miss this beautiful festival when we literally hold the Torah as the Torah holds us.





Rabbinic Thoughts

The month of Elul has begun and with it the daily Shofar blowing. The Shofar is a wake-up call for our conscience that the High Holidays are imminent and we should prepare for them by doing Repentance (Teshuwah). But Teshuwah is not only a task and a commandment; it is also a unique gift to us, because it opens the possibility for change, for reparation, for a new beginning. It's not about perfecting the ego, often in books on self-optimization. Rather, it's about raising awareness of our limitations. Instead of critically examining ourselves, we often seek the mistakes of others. It is said that angels have four faces and can look in all directions. But we humans only have one face with which we look into the world—and the back of our head is blindly facing backwards. There hide the things that we would rather not perceive; these are the behaviors and habits in which we have conveniently settled. Repentance, however, demands of us an honest willingness to deal with our blind spots. We have to ask critical questions. What went wrong in my life this past year? What relationships have broken and what was my role in it? This process of self-questioning is often accompanied by grief, pain and shame, but there is no shortcut to make it easier. We can not hope that the inner and outer fractures heal by themselves; we have to tackle it ourselves and avoid the usual excuses.

May we muster the necessary strength and patience for this path of repentance, opening ourselves up to new beginnings. May we all be enrolled and sealed for a good year in 5779—a New Year in which we may be blessed with peace, health and happiness.
