Rabbinic word

We are entering the darkest time of the year, the weeks and months when our region of the earth is furthest from the sun. The darkness and cold are not solely of cosmic origin. The ongoing attacks on Ukraine, the sight of many destroyed towns and cities that were once home to many of our members, the fear of the people there and of a winter without electricity and heating — all this leaves no one unmoved. Add to that the many other wars, conflicts, and irreconcilability that the news brings to our homes every day. It's not easy not to give up. But where does hope come from?



Hungarian-Jewish resistance fighter Hannah Senesh, executed by Nazi collaborators in 1944, was also a gifted poet whose lyrics are yet to be discovered. She countered the omnipresent violence with these words:

While the bonfires of war burn against the flames Igniting the bloody stormy days I light my little lamp to seek — to seek a Mensch.

It is not without reason that the festivals of lights in many cultures fall in the dark season. This is the time when we humans need hope and comfort most. As we light the first Hanukkah candle on December 18th, adding an additional candle to the Hanukkiah each evening, the candles glow brighter and brighter, giving us confidence that darkness will not prevail. Hanukkah is the festival of self-assertion and the casting out of darkness through an increase in light. May the Hanukkah candles that we put in the window give us strength and hope, and may we also pass on to other people the bright light of hope.

November 9th

On November 9th we gathered at the Holocaust Memorial in front of our new synagogue, together with the Society for Christian-Jewish Cooperation and many citizens of Hamelin in somber commemoration.

Local high school students read short personal essays and reflections on anti-Semitism and its current disturbing manifestations. The young people then read the names of the over 100 Jews from Hamelin who were murdered in the Shoah. Several wreaths, stones and flowers were placed on the fence. We would like to thank Soprano Lauren Welliehausen for the moving musical arrangement.

After the memorial service, we gathered in the synagogue for a study session, led by Rabbi Offenberg, with texts from the Jewish tradition relating to respect and acceptance of others in society.

Again our members, male and female, were busy on Mitzvah Day to bring joy to others. A large team spent many hours in the kitchen baking cookies, rugelach and other delicacies. They were then nicely wrapped and taken home to elderly and sick members. Earlier service times in winter

Since it's getting dark so early, evening services will begin at 5:00 p.m. and continue until the end of winter in March. If it's still too late and dark in December and January, you're cordially invited to come at 4:00 p.m. for coffee, tea and pastries and a chat with Rabbi Offenberg.

Hanukkah

This year our Festival of Lights starts on December 18th and runs until December 25th. We will celebrate together in the community on Sunday, December 18th, at 5:00 p.m. We will ignite the first candle and then our celebration will be enriched with a Sand Show by the artist Natalia Moro "Hanukkah & Chagall and Bella." Natalia Moro, who was born in Odessa and now lives in Düsseldorf, uses Hanukkah motifs in her program and combines the Sand Show Illumination with images by Marc Chagall. We thank the Central Council of Jews for supporting this performance.

Lecture

Regina Jonas, who in 1935, was the first woman in the world to receive a rabbinical certificate. She lived and worked as a rabbi in Berlin and visited Jewish communities throughout Germany. In a time of severe persecution and disenfranchisement, she stood by the oppressed, trying to convey support and confidence. In November 1942 she was deported to Theresienstadt together with her mother. She followed her rabbinic calling in the concentration camp, gave lectures on biblical, Talmudic and ethical topics and worked as clergy in the team of the famed Viennese psychiatrist Viktor E. Frankl.

Rabbi Offenberg and Martin Heimbucher, Reformed Church President emeritus, followed the traces of her work in Berlin and Theresienstadt and shed light on the last years of her life. Numerous newly discovered testimonies combine to form an impressive overall picture. On Thursday, December 1, 7:00 p.m., they will present the work of Rabbi Regina Jonas in Berlin and Theresienstadt from 1938 to 1944. The event takes place in our synagogue and is in cooperation with the Society for Christian-Jewish Cooperation Hamelin. Please join us for the history of this amazing Jewish leader.
